### **Executive Director's Message**

The 2021-2022 fiscal year marked both a new sense of "normalcy" at the Greenville Museum of Art (GMoA) following the worst of the COVID-19 pandemic in the 2020-2021 fiscal year, as well as a year of significant institutional change and progress.

In anticipation of our re-accreditation with the American Alliance of Museums (AAM) in 2022, we undersent a significant long-term strategic planning process involving the GMoA Staff, Board of Trustees, and community stakeholders. We approved a new mission, vision, and set of core values related to the current operations and future of the Museum as a whole. Our new mission, "to inspire, educate, and connect people through the



visual arts by way of our collection, exhibitions, and programs," serves our broader vision for the cultural life of Eastern North Carolina. We believe the arts are essential to the health and development of individuals and communities, and with our grounding core values of inclusivity, engagement, collaboration, and accountability, the GMoA is well poised to provide even more meaningful art opportunities for our region. This mission, along with our strategic plan objectives for the next three years, drove the remainder of the 2021-2022 fiscal year, and ultimately earned us our 10-year re-accreditation with AAM in June 2022, an accomplishment awarded to less than 4% of museums in the United States.

As it relates to our events and fundraisers, staff remained flexible, pivoting and adapting our events and programs with every turn of the pandemic. We were glad to host a majority of our in-person events once again this year. Combining these events with some of our virtual fundraisers that began during the pandemic, we capitalized on every form of reaching our audiences and successfully surpassed our budgetary goals in the 2021-2022 fiscal year. We were also glad to see the restart and growth of our educational outreach programs following closures in March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In the last year, we continued to make improvements to the facility, including a complete repair and re-painting of the exterior of our historic facility and the installation of outdoor banner frames on the 8th Street side of our building, which will continue to feature artwork from current exhibitions. We also hosted thought-provoking and engaging exhibitions such as *Undoing* and *Growing Up Queer in the South*. Through exhibitions such as these, we continue to engage our audience in timely and meaningful conversations and provide opportunities for them to engage with these ideas through creative expression.

We are excited about some changes made to our staff line-up in the new fiscal year. We increased hours for our part-time Educational Coordinator position in order to grow our on-site museum educational programs, ultimately hiring Briana Earl, a recent MFA graduate from East Carolina University, in this role. We also created a new part-time Gallery Attendant position, hiring Leslie Perez, a former GMoA intern, for this role. We are excited about the energy they both bring to these positions and about the growth of our staff in general. "Growth" is definitely the word of the year!

I remain overwhelmed by the support of our community - we could not have made it through another trying pandemic year without our supporters. On behalf of the GMoA Staff, thank you for your generous advocacy and support of the Museum. Thank you also to our GMoA Board of Trustees, who made vital contributions over the last year and volunteered much of their time and effort toward making sure our events, exhibitions, and programs were successful, engaging, and enjoyable. We are honored to serve our community and look forward to what this next year will bring.

### **Summary**

As seen in the Greenville Museum of Art (GMoA) Budget for the 2021-2022 fiscal year, the Museum surpassed our overall net goal despite canceling two fundraisers due to COVID-19 ramping up again in fall of 2021 and the shuffling of event dates. To make up for these, we held our Summer Shindig fundraiser twice in this fiscal year - in September and June. While not what we initially planned for this year, this change will allow us to shift back to our pre-COVID-19 fundraising calendar of holding the Summer Shindig at the end of the fiscal year and our Fashion on Display event at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Other adjustments were made to ongoing fundraisers, including our annual Halloween and Santa events, both of which included reduced ticket pricing to accommodate even more families and individuals in Pitt County. While we were not able to hold our annual fashion show fundraiser this year, we are excited for the return of this event in September 2022.

Throughout the year, GMoA Staff continued to cut unnecessary costs; obtain grant funding for facility projects, educational programs, and overall operational expenses; and set in motion a more realistic financial plan for the coming year, including a reduced number of high-impact fundraisers as well as a 2% annual disbursement from our Endowment. GMoA Trustees and Staff are committed to being good financial stewards of the Museum and aim to provide the general membership good news at the end of every fiscal year.

### **Rachel Maxwell Moore Art Foundation**

The Rachel Maxwell Moore Art Foundation celebrates and honors the vision and commitment of Rachel Maxwell Moore (1890-1964), an Eastern North Carolina native, Greenville resident, and civic leader, who believed in the power of art to enrich and transform lives and communities. Rachel Maxwell Moore was a leading civic figure and arts advocate in Greenville, and was central to the founding of the Museum's predecessor in 1939 and its eventual permanent location in the Flanagan Home. She established the Rachel Maxwell Moore Art Foundation in 1963, and before she passed away in 1964, bequeathed funds to the Foundation for the sole purpose of purchasing works of art for the GMoA's permanent collection.

The Rachel Maxwell Moore Art Foundation Gallery honors Moore's spirit, and the GMoA recognizes the essential role of the Foundation in building the permanent collection of the Museum, as well as in creating exhibition space for items in the permanent collection. The Foundation Officers are Will Corbitt (chair), Henry Smith, and Nelson Crisp. In the 2021-2022 fiscal year, the Foundation purchased 2 artworks of outstanding quality, including one drawing by Richard Wilson and one painting by Dewey Funkhouser from his exhibition at the GMoA in 2020, both featured below.

### **Exhibition Highlights**

Thank you to all who visited and supported the Greenville Museum of Art's exhibitions in 2021-2022! This year brought several exciting group exhibitions featuring artists from across the country.

#### Black, White, and Read All Over

Closing out the 2020-2021 exhibition season, Black, White, and Read All Over featured work by Cary, North Carolina-based artists Jillian Goldberg, Susan LaMantia, and Constance Pappalardo. This exhibition centered on the intersections of words, color, line, and language circulated through social media and sometimes lost in translation, as well as the dehumanization and isolation of digital communication. Using a limited color palette of neutral colors and shades of red along with the incorporation of text, each artist was deeply attentive to the topic of literacy and the waning presence of print in an increasingly digital and virtual world. In their work, they explored whether the magic of print on paper has been lost to the more instant, convenient, and affordable format of digital media.





In addition to our opening reception in June, which welcomed over 50 visitors, we hosted "The Art of Jazz" on August 6th (below), which featured performances by



students from East Carolina University's School of Music, as well as the main talent of the evening, pianist Lenore Raphael and bassist Carroll Dashiell. Over 75 visitors were in attendance and enjoyed lively performances, as well as an artist talk by Jillian Goldberg about artwork inspired by music from the exhibition.

### **Exhibition Highlights**

### **Undoing**

Undoing was on display from October 8, 2021 to March 11, 2022. This exhibition included art made from everyday and found materials by four artists: Krista Clark (Atlanta, GA), BR Goldstein (Durham, NC), Grace Hong (Brooklyn, NY), and Michael Watson (Brooklyn, NY). The title Undoing referred to all four artists' processes of deconstructing everyday objects or materials through the creation of their work. Knowing that viewers bring their own associations to the familiar materials found throughout this exhibition, Undoing also related to the loosening of spoken and written language as the primary means of conveying information or ideas.








We hosted numerous tours of this exhibition, including for our Uptown STEAM partnership with the North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences in Greenville. Tours focused on recycling and reusing materials for the purposes of making artwork.


### **Exhibition Highlights**

### **East Carolina University Printmaking MFA & BFA Exhibition**

This year, we hosted four students from the East Carolina University printmaking program, including two graduating MFA students, Adam Noah Berman and Katya Lee Hutchinson, and two graduating BFA students, Kevin Gonzales and Dylan Rishel. Over 140 attendees to the opening reception in April helped celebrate the students' achievements. We also hosted a group of over 100 students from Pitt County Schools for a STEAM tour of the exhibition and a guided nature-based printmaking activity led by Adam Berman.



### **Pitt Community College Exhibition**



Also returning this year was the Pitt Community College Fine Arts and Graphic Design Portfolio Exhibition, featuring a wide range of work by students from the academic year. Installed by faculty in graphic design and fine arts, the exhibition was on display from April 28 - May 22, 2021 and showcased sculptures, photos, fashion, multimedia works, paintings, drawings, digital art, and graphic

design work by recent graduates. We hosted 150 people for the opening reception in May in celebration of the students' work.

### **Exhibition Highlights**

#### **Growing Up Queer in the South**

Growing Up Queer in the South, a ground-breaking exhibition guest curated by Parks McAllister opened in June 2022 and remains on display until September 24, 2022. This exhibition documents both the personal and shared experiences of LGBTQ+ folks through art influenced and inspired by the exhibiting artists' formative years spent in the American South. The Call for Artworks was open to all individuals, 18 years or older, who identify within the LGBTQ+ community and have



spent part of their lives or could identify with "growing up" in the American South. The GMoA received nearly 300 submissions from over 100 artists living across the United States, ultimately selecting around 60 powerful and poignant artworks in a wide variety of media, including installations, sculptures, textiles, paintings, photographs, and prints. Thanks to many generous sponsors, we were able to award \$1,000 in prizes to artists at the opening reception.



In addition to hosting nearly 300 attendees at the opening reception on June 3rd, including a number of artists and supporters traveling from out of state, we will host a panel discussion related to Healthcare and the LGBTQ+ Community in August 2022, a Downtown Dialogues in the Humanities and Arts panel discussion in September 2022, and a closing reception on September 24.

### **Educational Programs**

#### **Outreach Programs**



The GMoA Educational Programs most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic were our outreach programs, but we are happy to report that many of these were back up and running in the 2021-2022 fiscal year. Long-standing partnerships that restarted following closure during the COVID-19 pandemic include all six locations of the Pitt County Council on Aging, Operation Sunshine, and the Boys & Girls Club. New partnerships in 2022 included programs with the Autism Society of NC, the Pitt County Detention Center, and HeARToscope. Our outreach art instructors this year included Andi Southern, Marie Hamra, and Darlene Williams.

We received a Pitt County Arts Council Grassroots Grant of \$3,300, West Greenville Community Grant from the City of Greenville for \$5,000, and a \$2,500 grant from First Citizens Bank to support the expansion of our outreach initiatives, especially those reaching underserved communities in Pitt County. These funds allowed us to reach over 1,760 adults and children from a wide variety of backgrounds.



#### **Visual Arts Academy**

The 2021-2022 fiscal year brought the return of a more "normal" Visual Arts Academy held at the GMoA Center for Art Education and led by Debbie Huggins and Jackie Herling. Nine students participated in the Visual Arts Academy program in the fall

and eight students participated in the spring, expanding their knowledge of how the visual arts can be used to express critical ideas. We celebrated the students' achievements with receptions at the end of each semester in our Commons Gallery.
